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# Project Overview

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- Purpose is to supplement existing Title X grants, in communities with demonstrated high risk for HIV/AIDS, to implement or expand HIV on-site prevention counseling, testing, and referral services
- Grantees funded through OPA/OFP with Title X and MAI funds



# Rationale for Funding

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What is  
the need?



Who does  
FP serve?

- Rising cases among women
- Women of color - especially Blacks and Latinas - disproportionately affected
- Poverty and lack of access to healthcare as risk factors
- Early detection of HIV/AIDS an ongoing challenge
- Higher burden of disease among females in the northeast and south

- Young, sexually active women; engaging in HIV risk behaviors at increased rates
- Many racial/ethnic minorities – especially Blacks/Latinas
- The low-income and uninsured
- Many family planning and HIV tested clients under age 25
- High numbers of HIV prevention projects in the northeast and southeast regions
- High levels of testing in the northeast and south central regions; growing levels of testing in the southeast

# Over the past 8 years, we have successfully

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- Expanded on-site HIV testing and referral services in Title X sites across the country, particularly in high-need areas
- Strengthened capacity to deliver HIV prevention services
- Increasingly adopted rapid testing and improved the rate of clients who receive their HIV test results
- Identified over 2,300 HIV+ clients and linked nearly all to care
- Reached out to critical subgroups, including Black/Latina females, high-risk males and partners, and young & old at-risk clients
- Supported early detection of HIV and improved patient outcomes and quality of life



# HIV Integration Project Funding

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Cycle 1: Oct 2001 – Aug 2004

34 projects, 8 PHS regions (19 states/territories)

Cycle 2: Sep 2004 – Sep 2007

63 projects, 10 PHS regions (27 states/territories)

Cycle 3: Oct 2007 – Oct 2010

80 projects, 10 PHS regions (34 states/territories)

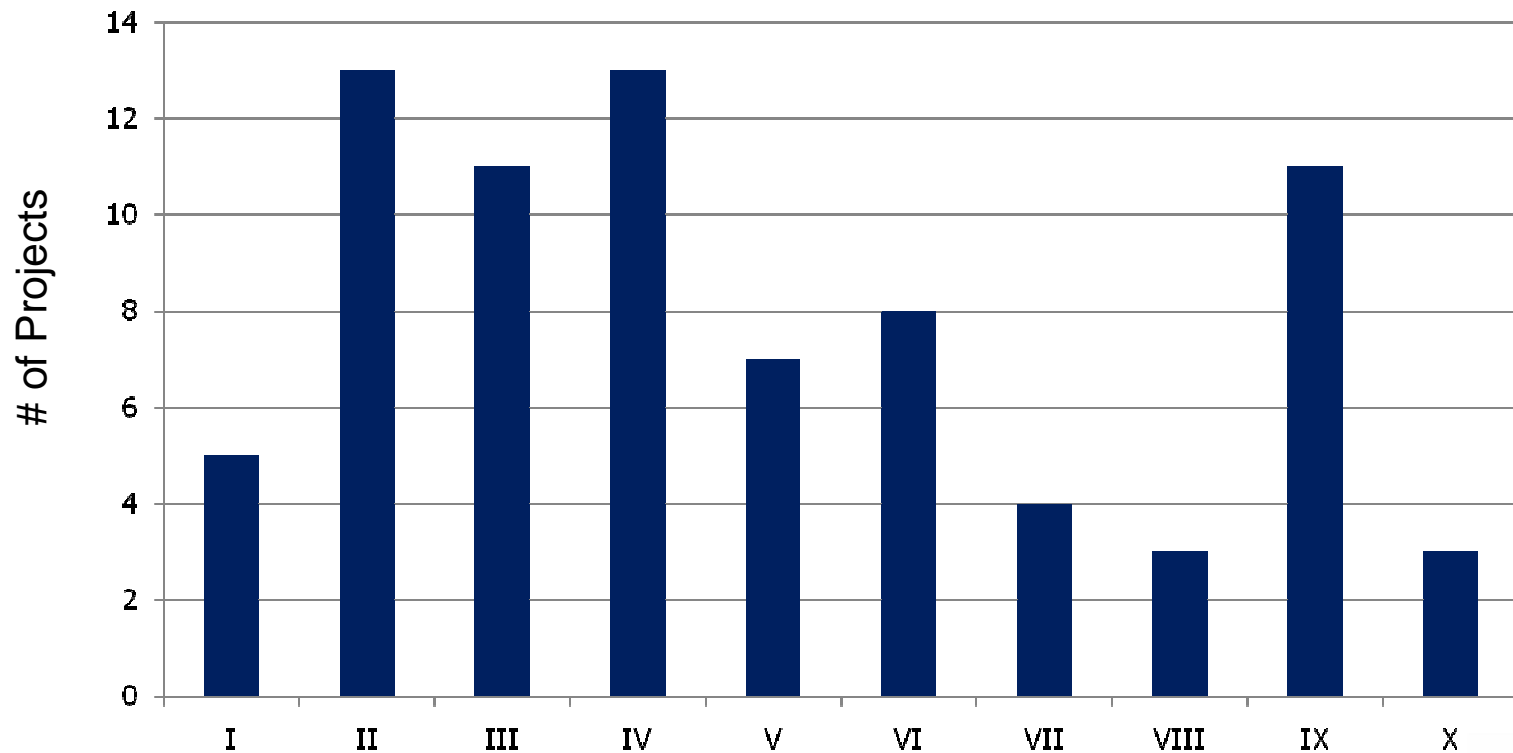
Cycle 4: Oct 2007 – Oct 2010

78 projects, 10 PHS regions (33 states/territories)

# Cycle 4 Funded Projects Highlights

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- 78 projects overall
  - 52 MAI funded
  - 26 Title X funded
- 15 newly funded
- 33 states and territories
  - Added projects in ID, KY, LA

# Project Monitoring

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- Number of HIV tests and result
  - By type (standard vs rapid)
  - By mode (confidential vs. anonymous)
  - By sex, age, race/ethnicity
- Number of client's receiving result
- Number of positives referred for Tx
- Staffing and training
- Measures build on those already collected by grantees for FPAR



# Cycle 4 Changes to Data Reporting Requirements

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- 1) **Minor changes to data submission schedule.**
- 2) **Additional variables.**
  - First Time Testers
  - New Positives
  - Number of clients with positive HIV test results who received their results, and
  - Number of clients with positive HIV test results who were linked to care (i.e. seen in a health-care setting by a physician, nurse practitioner, or physician assistant within 3 months of positive test)
- 3) **Option for client level data submission.**

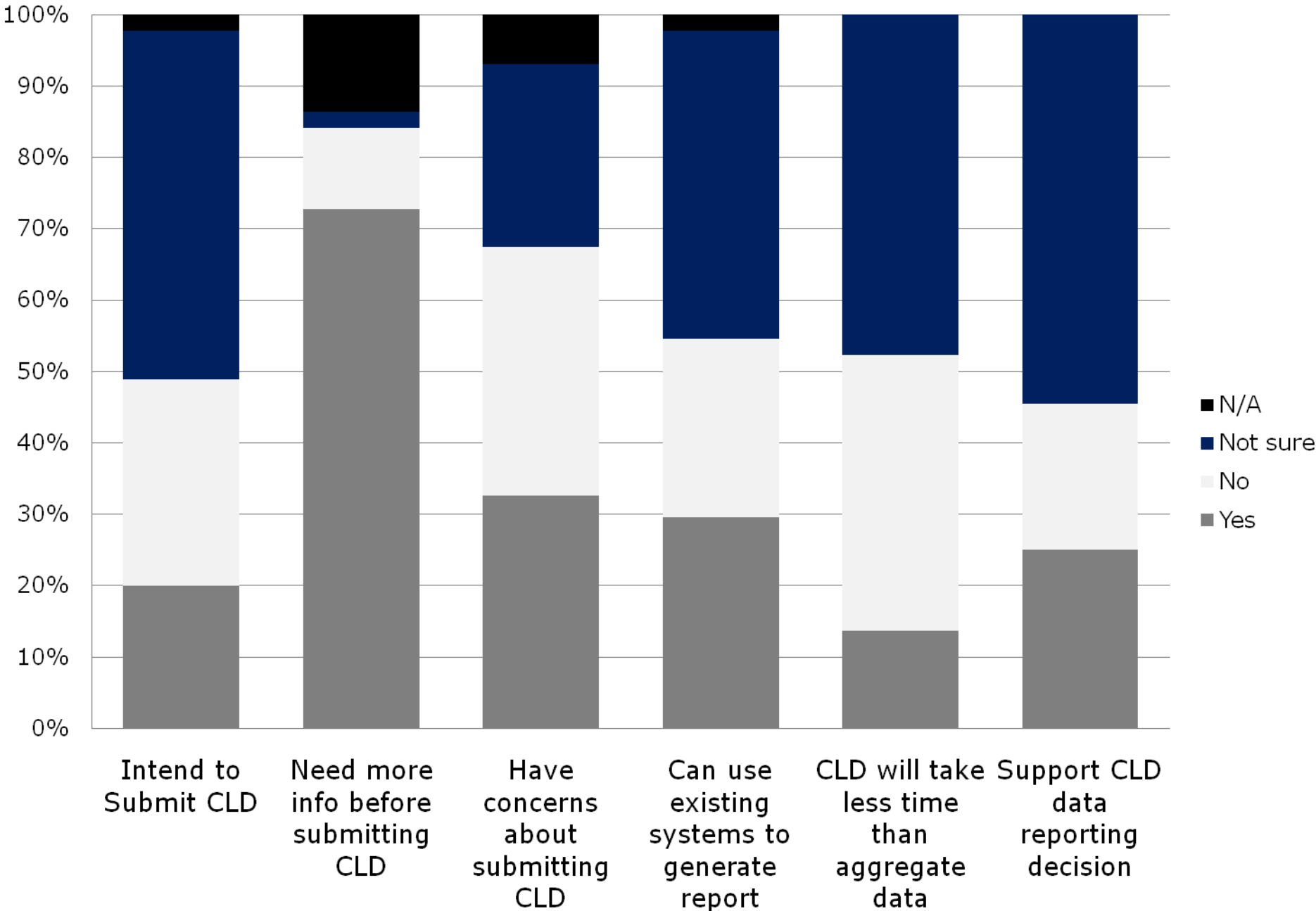


# 1. Please provide information about your agency's capacity for and interest in submitting client level data (CLD).

Option for client level data submission	Yes	No	Not Sure	N/A
a. We intend to submit client level data. (n=45)	20%	29%	<b>49%</b>	2%
b. We need more information before making a decision about submitting client level data. (n=44)	<b>73%</b>	11%	2%	14%
c. We have serious concerns about submitting client level data. (n=43)	33%	35%	26%	7%
d. Our existing data systems could be used to generate a client level data file. (n=44)	30%	25%	43%	2%

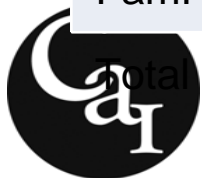

- Compliance with FP program guidelines
- Unsure if current systems can generate CLD
- New congressional mandates for first time testers
- Increased costs to support data reporting

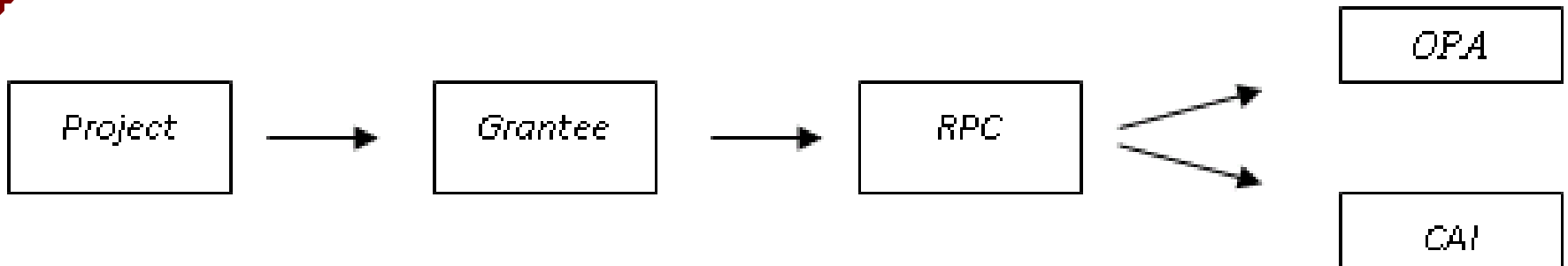
## Needs:
